

CI HISTORY CORNER by Bob Stearns

Connie, Diane and the Air National Guard

The year? 1955. The place? The headwaters of the Farmington River, located just north of Camp Jewell. The problem? The ground was saturated. Very, very saturated.



Fresh milk, bread, and beets airlifted in. What, no Bug Juice?

It had all begun quite innocently the week before when a rather small hurricane had passed over the area on August 12th. Named Connie, it dumped about 6 inches of rain. The rivers and reservoirs were used to such rainfall so it wasn't a big deal, even though it left them at above normal levels. It wasn't a big deal for the ground either, which had thirstily soaked up as much as it could hold, looking forward to the lush greenery that soon would follow.

Then came Diane on August 18th. Hurricane #2. Over a 36-hour period Diane dumped some 20 inches of rain into the headwaters of the Farmington River. With the intensity of rainfall and the already saturated soil, the rivers and reservoirs rose and rose. And kept rising until they overflowed their banks and broke through their dams. It was estimated that the Farmington River rose some 25–30 feet and moved at speeds up to 50 miles per hour. Towns such as Winsted were nearly wiped off the map by the flooding. There was devastation everywhere along the river's path.

Meanwhile back at Jewell, it had been the last few days of camp for the summer. Final banquet, closing campfire, heartfelt goodbyes to new best friends, and buses coming to take everyone back to Hartford and home. Or so they thought. As the torrential rain fell throughout the day and night, veteran camp directors Walt Malins and Paul Burch, could sense a problem was brewing. Unable to remove the flashboards on the dam due to the extreme pressure, the lake rose until most of the athletic field was underwater and all that could be seen of Chapel island were the treetops. But all the cabins were on high ground and everyone was safe.

With all the main roads in the area washed out, and thousands of people stranded and in need of assistance, the governor of Connecticut mobilized the Air National Guard and a massive rescue operation was launched. Dozens of helicopters were enlisted in the effort with some of them bringing supplies to Camp Jewell. According to logbooks, helicopters delivered 4 sacks of flour, 5 cases of evaporated milk, 350 loaves of bread, five sacks of potatoes, a crate of beets, and fresh milk from a farm in West Hartland. What, no bug juice?

Eventually the roads were made passable and the buses were able to get through to take the campers home. For them, however, it was just another amazing adventure that was part of their Camp Jewell experience. They were safe, spirits were high, they got to spend an extra day with their friends. They were thrilled by helicopters landing on the athletic field, and they had stories to tell and memories to share for the rest of their lives. That's what Camp Jewell is all about.
